Social Planning

Revitalizing Research and Convening for Understanding and Collaboration

Community Development Halton's Social Planning Team embarked on a yearlong journey to publish a seven-part series called [Our Halton 2023](#). Community Development Halton (CDH) introduced the Our Halton series in 2018 to raise awareness of the changing socio-demographic characteristics of Halton. This 2023 update includes peer-reviewed issues on: Women, Income Inequality and Poverty, Housing, Diversity, Volunteerism, Older Adults, Children and Youth. The main data source for the

series is Statistics Canada's Census of Population in addition to other National, Provincial and local data.



Each publication release was followed by an on-line presentation and community dialogue drawing together hundreds

of individuals over the course of the year.

Each gathering was an opportunity to talk through the findings and discuss ways the data can be used in planning for the community and collaborating for change. In addition, there were four in-person events in 2023-2024 that had participants working in small groups to take an even deeper dive into the research, with some wonderful help from community partners lending a hand as peer facilitators.

CDH also reinstituted its monthly publication, renamed [Community Data Watch](#). Each publication focused on a specific topic viewed through a Halton lens. Community Data Watch has also provided the opportunity to reintroduce mapping into CDH's analysis of community data.



CDH wants to thank the members of its Research Advisory Committee for their guidance and encouragement and the many peer reviewers that played an essential role in forming each publication.

Event on the State of Halton's Nonprofit Sector

November 2023

In November 2023, CDH invited Halton nonprofit leaders to gather to hear the Halton results of the Ontario Nonprofit Network's (ONN) State of the Sector survey. The group of 60 local nonprofit leaders were joined by ONNs Executive Director Cathy Taylor. This was a dynamic half day together spent discussing policy recommendations for the sector. A 2024 event is being planned.

CDH Educates Workshop Series

CDH Educates Workshop series provides profes-
sional development training for leaders of volunteers,
nonprofit sector workers, and community volunteers.
It is an essential part of CDH's information sharing
and capacity building work.

Halton Nonprofit Congress

November 18, 2023

Guided by a common goal of setting organizations up for success, the Town of Oakville, City of Burlington, Town of Milton, and Town of Halton Hills, under the leadership of Volunteer Halton, worked together and delivered the first Halton Non-Profit Congress on Saturday November 18, 2023, at the Milton Sports Centre with 78 people registering for the day-long event, representing 45 different organizations from across Halton Region. The event featured key-note speaker Rosita Hall and a rich selection of afternoon workshops.

Other Workshops and Capacity Building Work

The Volunteer Halton Team has also been engaged in a variety of targeted and made to order training, presentations, and facilitation, such as the Building Strong Organizations series with the Town of Halton Hills, monthly workshops with newcomers through Halton Connects, to name just a couple.



Senior Connector Project

With funding from the Ministry of Seniors and Accessibility, CDH continued the Senior Connector project until March 2024. Under the supervision of the Director, Volunteer Halton, a dedicated program coordinator was hired, who re-engaged current Senior Connectors and recruited new older adult volunteers to the Connector team. **From June 2023 to March 2024, Senior Connectors attended 45 outreach events** (an average of 5 per month), **reaching over 1650 individuals**, connecting them to essential local information for health and well-being. We are grateful to the Senior Connectors and their commitment to other seniors in Halton.

National Volunteer Week 2023

In the lead up to National Week 2023 (April 16 – 22), over 300 nominations were submitted by CDH member agencies for the annual awards celebrating the incredible impact volunteers have in Halton Region.

Celebrations were held in each municipality and at each, deserving volunteers were recognized with Cheers to Volunteers or Halton Volunteer Impact awards. Volunteer Halton is grateful for the community partners who took the time to be part of the National Volunteer Week nomination process.
